To better care for children and families in our community, Connecticut Children's Medical Center has moved its primary care services to a new facility located at 76 New Britain Avenue in Hartford.



Working and Living Local:

Hartford Institutions Making Homeownership a Reality for Employees

SINA's member institutions - Hartford Hospital, Trinity College, and the Connecticut Children's Medical Center - are helping to make homeownership a reality in the South End through the Homeownership Incentive Program (HIP).

The MetroHartford Alliance established HIP in 2012 after studying its success in several cities throughout the country. The program provides

a financial incentive for workers in participating institutions to move to Hartford, closer to their work. HIP also makes it possible for renters to become owners. In the Asylum Hill neighborhood, NINA is working with Aetna, and Saint Francis Hospital to help employees become homeowners. In the South End, the SINA institutions have made it possible for thirteen employees to become homeowners, many for the first time.

Employees in good standing at Hartford Hospital, Connecticut Children's Medical Center and Trinity College are eligible for a \$10,000 forgivable loan to buy a home in Hartford's South End, which includes about half of Hartford's neighborhoods. This grant is forgiven in its entirety after five years of residence in the home. SINA guides participants of HIP through a process that includes finding a lender and completing all of the necessary paperwork.

So far, Hartford Hospital has dedicated \$130,000 to the program over three years and Trinity College, which launched its program in 2014, now has two participants. This summer Connecticut Children's Medical Center started its participation in HIP, when employee, Luis Loza, purchased SINA's newly constructed Cityscape Home on Zion Street.

During his interview on "El Show de Analeh" following the purchase, Mr. Loza explained, "I learned a lot during the process... and I have finally become a homeowner."

HIP benefits both the homebuyers and the communities of which their employers are a part. Participants must buy in the neighborhoods of South Central Hartford.

Joanne Berger-Sweeney Elected Trinity's 22nd President

Joanne Berger-Sweeney, Ph.D., was named in March as the 22nd president of Trinity College following a unanimous vote by the College's Board of Trustees. An accomplished teacher, scholar, neuroscientist, and administrator, Berger-Sweeney has served since 2010 as the dean of the School of Arts and Sciences at Tufts University in Medford, Massachusetts.

Berger-Sweeney, who came to Tufts after serving 19 years as a faculty member and associate dean at Wellesley College, is the first African American and first woman to be elected president of Trinity. She succeeded James F. Jones, Jr. as president on July 1, 2014, following his retirement after 10 years of distinguished service.

Berger-Sweeney said of her selection, "I am honored and humbled to be joining the Trinity community at such an important time for the College and for American higher education. ... With the strong alumni and alumnae support base, I look forward to the successes the faculty, staff, students, and I will achieve together."

Berger-Sweeney received her undergraduate degree in psychobiology from Wellesley College, an M.P.H. in environmental health sciences from the University of California, Berkeley, and a Ph.D. in neurotoxicology from the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health. She completed her postdoctoral training at the National Institute of Health (INSERM) in Paris, France.

Buying a home in these communities is beneficial for several reasons. It improves the rate of homeownership in areas that have suffered substantially lower homeownership rates and struggled through the recent housing recession.

In addition, homeowners represent a source of stability in the community. It is common for homeowners to participate actively in the community and make long-term investments for the neighborhood's well-being.

Living in the South End also makes walking to work a possibility and promotes an environmentally friendly lifestyle.

Sandra Magee from Trinity's Human Resources Department shared, "By living close to work, employees save commute time and money and help to improve the environment, while enjoying easy access to the many benefits the area has to offer."

Trinity College English Professor, Katherine Bergren, was Trinity's first participant in HIP. In April, she and her husband closed on a house in the Southwest neighborhood.

"The neighborhoods around Trinity have a lot of wonderful things about them. To live in the city where I work is very important to me," said Bergren. "It went really smoothly working with SINA. There were no hitches along the way, and our neighbors are the most welcoming people we've ever met."
